EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT

Executive Director Report

Tennis continued to see an enormous growth in participation by end of 2023 – the numbers for unique players and total number of participants in both junior and adult programming in our state is astonishing. As we have said for the past few years, our main need for the tennis community is to have many more hundreds of indoor courts to keep up with the demand. The facilities in our state are also seeing such a large increase in players that they are becoming full to the brim. This is a great "state of the sport" for tennis – it's a boom that we have not seen since the 1980s. While the public sometimes thinks that tennis participation is "flat" or "dying" – we know that the very opposite is true both in our state and across the country.

I am so proud of our Utah Tennis Staff – their creativity, dedication, and ability to always find a way to give the tennis community more opportunities to play is amazing. I am also forever grateful to our Board of Directors that support innovation and a teeny bit of risk when they let us try programs and projects that are new to both us and to the USTA family at large.

Cherstin Harris, our Junior Tournament Competition Manager, is the go-to source for all information regarding the ever-changing terrain of junior competition. With UTR, WTN, and USTA tournament products, it can be very confusing for the public to navigate the junior pathway and all the ways players can find competition both recreationally and competitively. Cherstin's analytical mind is constantly thinking about how to provide the best tournament experience for the juniors. The Snowball tournament in January, Utah State Open in June, Labor Day Masters in August, and a new team event opportunity called the Candy Cup were all part of Cherstin's programs for the year. Junior competition participation numbers continue to climb in our state. Utah has seen some very high Nationally ranked players over the past few years, including Caden Hasler — who was #1 in the Boys 18s doubles Nationally this past year.

Ally Sundberg continues to find a way to handle the massive influx of league players to our program. In 2022, Utah League play broke the 10,000-registrant mark and in 2023 we increased that number to 10,870 players. Ally continually thinks of ways to tweak the schedule and the player experience so that everyone can find a home on a team and enjoy the competition that league play creates for each team. The Tri-Level league, which had struggled in previous years, found a format that seemed to work well at last, so we are happy to keep that product in our line-up.

Gretchen Soffe, as our Outreach Manager, works non-stop to make sure any person interested in our sport finds a home in our tennis community — either through short-format tournaments, socials, costume-based 4Score tournaments, or Tennis 101 programming around the valley. The Tennis 101 program is so much fun to see new people laughing and loving the sport and Gretchen makes sure they feel welcome. As the Outreach Manager, Gretchen organizes all aspects of UTA's participation in May is National Tennis Month in America and the PRIDE parade. If you have never been part of our PRIDE float — come join us — it is a very joyful day connecting with thousands of people. "Come Play With Us" is something we believe strongly, and Gretchen helps make that happen.

Garrett Snyder has embraced the junior recreational player – creating so many opportunities for them to become comfortable competing in a more casual setting than the traditional "Ranked" tournaments. Dylan Richardson joined the UTA team, helping Garrett reach over 537 players through 27 events in the

year. Garrett makes sure that he hosts the Junior Circuit events at multiple locations around the valley so that players do not have to travel far to find match play experience. Moving into 2024, Garrett will be adding the role of Adult Tournament Manager – hoping to increase the opportunities for adults to play in short-format tournaments year-round.

During 2023, the National USTA reached out to our Utah Tennis staff to run a pilot pickleball team event. Jeremy Horner, our Pickleball Manager, was the Tournament Director for this event that took place in Las Vegas late October. Eighteen co-ed teams from across the country played in this first-ever recreational team pickleball event which was super fun for everyone involved. Jeremy also ran the pickleball portion for the Of Love tournament this year with a growth in participation to over 300 players. Adding pickleball to the OF Love event extends our reach to even more families in our community to help raise funds for both Juvenile Diabetes research and the Utah Tennis Foundation, our charitable giving non-profit.

Trent Shorter, our Northern Utah Area Coordinator, is continuing his work to bring more competitive and social tennis to the Northern part of our state. The 2023 Raspberry Open at Bear Lake was a blast with lots of people travelling to this destination tournament and Trent, with his gregarious personality, is the perfect host for this event.

Ashley Agrelius, as our Communication/Web manager, never stops thinking of ways to improve the customer interface with our website. Ashley pushes our staff to work more efficiently, using the technology to connect us to each other more seamlessly and make sure we are reaching the public in the most professional way. While Ashley lives in Colorado now, her humor lightens our weekly staff meetings — even if she is on a large screen from 600 miles away. Darcy Tsandes, our fearless Finance Manager, has streamlined our office finances as we have doubled in size over the past 10 years. Darcy is so efficient in keeping everything smooth and running seamlessly this year.

While I absolutely love running all the traditional format adult tournaments each year (The Utah State Open and the Albion IceBreaker), my heart and soul is with the Ardene Bullard Of Love tournament. It is now the largest Adult/Junior tournament in the country, with over 1300 event participants and over 800 unique players. I'm not sure how it happens, but the Of Love continues to grow in participation each year— and the support we feel from the community for this fundraiser is astonishing. Our partnership with the Bullard family makes this event a joy to be part of and truly feels like "It takes a village..."

Thank you for all you do to make our sport a joyful way to connect with people. Tennis is truly the sport of a lifetime – I know it has been for many years for me and I wish that joy for everyone in our community.

JUNIOR COMPETITION

Junior Competition

Utah Tennis Association (USTA) Tournaments and Initiatives

Operating under a relatively new pathway for junior players, USTA tournaments are categorized into Levels. Level 7 tournaments are the entry level competitive experience. The Level 1 tournaments are the National Championships. Utah is allowed to host multiple Level 7s and 6s each year, and our allotment for Level 5 tournaments is 3 (The Utah State Open and the Ardene Bullard Of Love tournaments). The Section hosts Level 4s and 3s with 2 of these tournaments taking place in Utah (The Snowball and the Labor Day Masters). Utah does not currently host any Level 1 or 2 National Championships.

As we bid farewell to 2023, the Utah tennis community has much to reflect upon in a year marked by growth, innovation, and a deepening commitment to player development. Here's a comprehensive review of the notable events and initiatives that shaped the tennis landscape in Utah.

USTA Utah Sectional Tournaments:

Level 4: ITA Snowball Championships (January)

• The year kicked off with the highly anticipated ITA Snowball Championships, drawing a remarkable 365 participants. This closed event exhibited the competitive spirit of Utah's tennis enthusiasts and set a vibrant tone for the winter season.

Level 4: ITA Labor Day Masters Open (September)

 September saw the successful ITA Labor Day Masters Open, attracting 283 participants. This event highlighted the enduring passion for tennis in Utah and served as a fitting conclusion to the summer season.

USTA Utah District Tournaments:

Level 5: Utah State Open (June)

 The Utah State Open in June boasted a strong turnout with 308 participants, affirming the popularity of district-level tournaments and the competitive fervor within the local tennis community.

Level 5: Ardene Bullard Of Love Open (July)

 In July, the Ardene Bullard Of Love Open further solidified the district-level tournaments as major fixtures, bringing together 362 participants in a celebration of tennis camaraderie.





USTA Tournaments:

Level 6: Girls IceBreaker (April)

• The Girls IceBreaker in April showcased the burgeoning talent in Utah tennis, with 58 players participating and demonstrating their skills on the court.

Introduction of New Tournaments:

Level 7 Tournaments (Throughout the year)

Responding to the increasing tournament sizes in Level 6 events, 2023 witnessed the
introduction of Level 7 tournaments. Designed for players transitioning into intermediate levels
of play, these one-day non-elimination tournaments provide valuable ranking points, facilitating
a smoother progression to higher levels of competition.

October: Level 5 Southern Utah Candy Cup

A highlight of the year was the inaugural Level 5 Southern Utah Candy Cup held in October. This
team event, located in St. George, featured 120 players divided into five teams in each age
division. Combining singles, same-gender doubles, and mixed doubles, this event not only
unveiled the skill of the players but also fostered a sense of community, with participants
traveling from St. George, Salt Lake Valley, Colorado, California, and Las Vegas,

Early Development Camp:


Rebooted Early Development Camp

Junior Circuit and Young Adult

USTA Junior Circuits

Junior Circuits is a singles program for juniors 13-18 years old. This entry-level tournament is a non-elimination, round-robin draw format. Players are grouped into flights based on their age and ability. This experience encourages players to develop their skills through level-based play and demonstrate good sportsmanship.

Utah Tennis Association hosted 28 events and accommodated 537 participants at these popular events. This accounts for an 80% increase in participants from 2022. We will continue to offer this wildly popular product in the future.

High School Camps

Camps are offered before the start of high school tennis seasons (Girls in summer and Boys in February) to hone player skills. The successful training camp includes ten hours of on and off court instruction. In 2023, 43 players participated from seven schools.

Young Adult Socials

We are pleased to offer engaging, social tennis events for Young Adults. These events, for 18-39 old players, are loaded with games, drills, and level-based match play. We hosted eight events over the year with 120 participants in 2023 and will continue to offer this product.

Outreach

New Player Inquiries

290 new players reached out to Utah Tennis Association through the Utah Tennis website, the USTA League website, Instagram, and Facebook. All were interested in learning more about the tennis opportunities in their area.

Adult Tennis 101

235 adults participated in our Adult Tennis 101 program designed for players who are new to tennis or returning from an absence. Four locations were offered: West Valley Centennial Park, Olympus Hills Park, Riverton City Park, and Farmington Shepard Park.



Adult Short Format Tournaments

The UTA offered ten Adult Short Format tournaments in 2023 in hopes of capturing player interested in tournament play but don't have time to dedicate an entire week to the event. All events catered to the men's singles contingent at all NTRP levels.

Pride Parade

The UTA participated in the 2023 Utah Pride Parade with over 100 tennis community members walking with Utah Tennis Association in support of our LGBTQ+ community. Our objective is to expose a different demographic to the idea that tennis is fun, great exercise, and

an incredible way to connect with others.

Social Tournaments

The UTA offered a number of unique tournament formats including ten 4SCORE One Day Tournaments, three Family Doubles Challenges and four community socials.

May Is National Tennis Month

During the month of May, with the objective of exposing more people to tennis, the UTA connected with several libraries who highlighted tennis literature at their facilities, offered three community socials and ran a sticker contest to celebrate tennis.

Outreach Committee

With Scotty Riding as the chair, the committee met several times during the year to discuss and brainstorm ideas about how to bring more people into the sport. Each committee member is utilized as a mentor to new players as they integrate into our community.



Northern Utah

The UTA was excited to complete our second year of tournaments in northern Utah's beautiful Cache Valley. In the past two years we have had good turnout, with great matches. We have had people come from Colorado, Wyoming, Idaho, Nevada and even two juniors from New York. Plus, our wonderful players from the Wasatch front as well as our great players here in Cache Valley.

Pickleball



USTA Community Tennis Associations (CTAs) are "any incorporated, geographically defined, not-for-profit, volunteer-based organizations that support or provide programs which promote and develop the growth of tennis" at the grassroots level. There are 13 active and registered CTAs within USTA Utah.

The Cache Valley Tennis Association (CVTA) Submitted by Carolee Hammel

CVTA was formed in 2006 to develop and support the growth of Tennis for all ages and abilities in Cache Valley. CVTA promotes the benefits of tennis and works to make tennis accessible to all.

Every year, we create and distribute to public facilities a Valley Events Poster which contains CVTA, USTA and Sports Academy tennis tournaments scheduled for the year.

CVTA runs two community tournaments during the summers.

The DUO Summer Challenge, established in 2007, is held in June at the Logan Rec Center. This event

offers singles, followed by doubles divisions.

CVTA also offers the Herald Journal Tennis Tournament the end of July/early August. The Herald Journal Tennis tournament has been the major annual valley tennis tournament since the 1960's, held at the Logan Rec Center. When the longstanding tournament director was unable to run it, so the CVTA stepped in to keep this tradition alive. The entries have certainly increased since we were able receive entries online, as well as post the draw sheets on our website.

Both tournaments hold a very strong Men's Open Singles and Doubles due to the many former high school stars and college players who love these community events. The women's events are starting to build as well, as many new players are

In our Spring 2023 season, we had over 2600 players participate in our programs across Salt Lake, Utah,

Washington, and Iron Counties.

In our Fall 2023 season, we had over 2400 players participate in our programs, while we also expanded into Tooele, Wasatch, Davis, Box Elder, and Cache Counties.

A third of our players are brand new to the sport. We love to introduce so many new kids to the wonderful sport of tennis, while also being able to provide regular competitive match experience to players of all skill levels.



As a huge proponent of team sports, we also provide a team tennis experience for these kids before they get to high school.



Our Fall 2023 Middle School "State"
Tournament was the most competitive ever, with players and teams from all over the state (having qualified through our region and sectional tournaments) competing for the "State" Championship.

We recruited, trained, and led over 350 coaches this year. Most are former high school players now in college, or tennisplaying parents with kids on the team.

Intermountain Honors and Awards -

USTA Intermountain Hall of Fame Inductee – Lindsay Rawstorne



Lindsay played four years of NCAA Division I (two years for Weber State College and two years University of Utah) with a high ranking of 20 in Singles and 11 in doubles. He briefly played on the ATP Tour to get a 580 ranking.

Lindsay has been a tennis teacher for 35 years and counting. He was certified USPTA Elite in 1993 and is currently managing and teaching at two tennis clubs in Utah - Ivory Ridge Tennis Club and Sunpro Tennis Club.

He has also served on USTA Utah Junior committees since 1993 and been volunteering with tennis wheelchair players for 15 years. Lindsay chaired the USTA Intermountain Junior Programs Committee for four years (while serving on the committee for ten years).

He was also a USPTA Utah Tester for five years and a high school tennis coach for both boys' and girls' teams for five years at Skyridge High School in Lehi.

Nikos Ridle Award - Caden Hasler

This award is presented annually to a junior tennis player within the USTA Intermountain Section who exemplifies the spirit of tennis through their activities on and off the court. The award is given in memory of Nikos Ridle, a nationally ranked junior player from Billings, MT, who was killed in an automobile accident at age 19. Section winners are submitted to the USTA for the Bill Talbert Junior Sportsmanship Award.

The David L. Freed Award - Susan Daynes

The David L. Freed Award was established in 1979 to be presented annually to an individual who has constantly provided leadership and example both in quality of play and service to the game. Daynes has spent a lifetime playing tennis and being involved in the Salt Lake tennis community. In addition to playing on competitive league teams, she began coaching at high school players at Judge Memorial before moving to Rowland Hall. She has been coaching both boys' and girls' tennis teams for the past 21 years.

Developmental Coach of the Year - Matt Sweet

Sweet is honored for his unending dedication to developing junior tennis players at all ability levels through teaching and coaching, presence at tournaments and events and the ability to positively impact the lives of junior players on and off the court.

Nominations for Sweet include "His understanding of the game in terms of technique, physical and mental stamina, strategy, and sportsmanship is second to none. Add to that his sense of humor and you have the perfect concoction for a tennis lesson."





Growing the Game - Thanh Huynh

The Growing the Game award is given to a player or organization who actively increased access and exposure to tennis, therefore bringing players into the sport. This person exemplifies inclusion, acceptance, and passion for the game.

Huynh implemented adult match play for the newest players to our sport – offering the chance to meet new partners in a safe setting. He works with UTA to promote more play by encouraging players to join league teams. "He lives and loves [tennis] and does a lot for so many players of all ages and abilities."

Family of the Year - The Mattsson Family

Established in 2007, the Family of the Year award is presented to the family who has exemplified the benefits of tennis as family recreational sport and has contributed to the tennis community in a significant way.



The Mattsson family has several generations of players and volunteers in the tennis community: Mike and Mary Mattsson, with children Michele and Ben Wilson, Derek and Kate Mattsson, and Liz and Tom Carlson, along with nine grandchildren. Mike and Michele were instrumental in advising and obtaining the funds and permissions for the new clubhouse at Wasatch Hills, volunteering thousands of hours to ensure a quality future of both Wasatch Hills and Liberty park Tennis Centers.



Volunteer of the Year - Bob Schovaers

Established in 1991, the Volunteer of the Year Award is presented annually to a person who personifies the dedication of the tennis player who gives selflessly to the growth of the sport through involvement and commitment to the state of Utah.

Schovaers has been involved in the Tennis & Tutoring program for the last several years. Tennis & Tutoring is a free afterschool program for underserved youth with multiple locations in the Salt Lake area. Bob says, "he has thoroughly enjoyed sharing some of my talent with the youth as it

was so generously shared with me by others during my younger years."

Kathy Rothfels & Luceen Sullivan Outstanding Girls High School Tennis Team – Rowland Hall

This award recognizes achievement in girls high school tennis but is not determined solely on win/loss record. This team won 1st place in #1 and #3 Singles and #1 Doubles at state championships. All 12 players lettered. Three players were academic Allstate players.

Wilbur Braithwaite Outstanding Boys High School Tennis Team – Rowland Hall

This award recognizes achievement in boys high school tennis but is not determined solely on win/loss record. All 5 positions on the team made it to the state finals. All 3 singles players earned State titles. Singles players were 60-0 in matches. All 23 players lettered. Three players were academic All-state winners.



Organization of the Year - Salt Lake Tennis & Health Club

This award is presented in recognition of the services rendered by a USTA Organization State of Utah and for their support to the Utah Tennis Association in helping grow tennis participation at all levels.

Salt Lake Tennis & Health Club offers a robust junior program for all ages, embracing the Red/Orange/Green/Yellow pathway for junior development. SLTHC has the highest average UTR rating for junior tennis players and send more players to higher education with scholarships than any other facility in the state.

Club owner, Laury Hammel (son of tennis community icons Lee & Ruby Hammel) was the first janitor at the Club's current location. 50 years later he purchased the club in order to revitalize it and keep tennis alive and thriving in the Salt Lake area.



Lee Hammel Award Outstanding Male High School Tennis Player - Jaiden Handlon

The Lee Hammel Award for Outstanding Male High School Tennis Player recognizes a male athlete for his achievements in high school tennis and also recognizes the individual for their overall performance, team spirit, sportsmanship, and attitude both on and off the court.

Handlon won Boys State 3A at Singles #1, losing a total of 3 games the entire tournament. He played 4 years varsity singles and was awarded MVP Award

his senior year of high school.

Ruby Hammel Award Outstanding Female High School Tennis Player - Maya Inouye

The Ruby Hammel Award for Outstanding Female High School Tennis Player recognizes a female athlete for her achievements in high school tennis and also recognizes the individual for their overall performance, team spirit, sportsmanship, and attitude both on and off the court.
